- 7 farms ranging from 7 100+ hectares



Flooding causes serious impacts

Damage to homes

- Floods basements & crawl spaces
- Damages structures & equipment
- Substantial economic loss to businesses/farms
- Crop damage losses per farm of \$10k to \$50k per year Stress, flood mitigation work & loss to residences
- Sandbagging, pumping & home repairs
 Potential drop in property values
 Impedes use & enjoyment of property

Flooding Events Are More Frequent

- Flooding has happened in 4 of last 6 years
- One comparable flood in the previous 20 years



Lazo Watershed Property Owners Committee Role

- Advocate for affected property owners
- Instrumented monitoring of groundwater levels & flow rates







Key Impacts of Status Quo

- More & more stormwater dumped into Lazo Marsh & Queen's Ditch
- Lazo Marsh Reduced capacity to retain stormwater
- Queen's Ditch Impeded flow through ditch
- Status Quo: Continued & escalating flood damage



Status Quo: Public Health & Safety Issues

- Health risks: Severe mosquito hatch due to large pools of stagnant water
- Safety risks: Road failures & traffic delays on Lazo Road







Solutions

- Reduce inflows
- Increase outflows
- Develop rules & framework for new development, monitor & enforce compliance
- Maintain stormwater system

Last week I sent you a completed request to appear before the Electoral Areas Service Committee on 09 March. As directed here is a brief synopsis of our purpose and a copy of our Power Point Presentation. Please advise if there is anything else we can provide to you before our presentation.

Synopsis:

We are the Lazo Watershed Property Owners Committee, ("LWPOC") a group of Area B residents who have experienced serious flooding in four of the past six years. This year's flooding was very severe with over 30 properties directly affected. In addition, the flooding causes public health and safety risks to the overall community. The consequences of the flooding are significant and our presentation will discuss both the causes and some solutions.

The LWPOC represents over 80% of the affected properties in the Lazo watershed and is composed of home, acreage and farm owners. In addition to consulting with subject experts and advisors, we have studied some 17 reports written over the last 20 years about storm water management in our specific area. Many of these reports list recommendations to help mitigate the effects of poor or non-existent storm water management. Our Committee recently made a presentation to a working group composed of the Town of Comox, Comox Valley RD, DND/ 19th Wing and MoTI. The presentation was well received and the ensuing discussion was positive and solution-oriented. One of the keys to success the meeting participants identified was getting help from the Regional District, which in turn, will help the other agencies find and contribute resources to solve the flooding problem. The Regional District is seen by the other stakeholders as the "lead" in any projects undertaken to stop the flooding.
