To lead the management of provincial level emergencies and disasters and support other authorities within their areas of jurisdiction.



Legislated Responsibilities

- Emergency Program Act (EPA)

- Defines responsibilities of local authorities, provincial ministries and crown corporations
- Responsibility for the Province's emergency management program

– Emergency Program Management Regulation

 Identifies Minister responsible for coordinating government response to specific hazards

Local Authority Emergency Management Regulation

- Outlines roles & responsibilities of Local Authority
- Compensation and Disaster Financial Assistance Regulation
 - Defines disaster financial assistance framework

Emergency Coordination Centre (ECC)

- Over 350,000 calls
- 24/7 operations 365 days/year
 - Operations Officer
 - Provincial Duty Manager
- 8000 Emergency Incidents
- 2400 road rescues
- 1300 search and rescues

- Increased staffing capacity needed to sustain operations
- ESS requires more refinement for large scale evacuations
- Review of key operational processes and procedures
- Strengthen Interagency coordination




Organizational Changes

Province of BC Seismic Initiatives

- Early stages of developing an earthquake early warning and seismic monitoring program for BC
- **Public Alerting**
- Province in the process of developing a public alerting system
- Targeted and location-appropriate alerts and messages to be received on multiple device types and social media channels
- Staff working to ensure public alerting and earthquake early warning program are complementary



First Nations Coordination & Support

On April 1, 2017 EMBC signed a 10 year service agreement with Indigenous and Northern Affairs Canada (INAC)

- EMBC to provide First Nation communities (on reserve) the same type of emergency management services that local governments receive
- Implementation of the agreement doubles EMBC's client base (181 Local Governments + 193 First Nations)



Emergency Management Partnerships

- Establishes and leads specialized regional emergency management partnership agreements with local governments to address cross-jurisdictional issues
- Coordinates BC 's participation in cross-border arrangements (e.g. PNEMA. EMMA)
- Coordinates and manages agreements with key stakeholders and non-government organizations (e.g. Red Cross)



Support to Local Governments & First Nations

- BCEMS Guide (Standard) --- addresses four phases of EM
- Hazard Risk and Vulnerability Assessment Tool
- Critical Infrastructure Assessment Tool
- Planning Tools -- Emergency Plan Template & Guide
- CEPF Community Emergency Preparedness Fund to support mitigation, planning, equipment and training
- Seasonal Readiness Workshops
- Training, Education Webinars and Exercises
- Public Education Materials and Templates -- PreparedBC





- PreparedBC is British Columbia's one-stop for disaster readiness information.
- Since its creation in 2015, it has built a library of preparedness guides and web resources.
- Core guides:
 - Household Preparedness Guide
 - Fill-in-the-blanks emergency plan
 - Condos, Apartments and Townhomes Guide
 - Guide for People with Disabilities
 - Pet Preparedness pamphlet
