The best option: the Reusable Bag








Why Ban Single-use Plastics?

- Single-use plastic bags, such as those commonly used at the grocery store, make up a significant portion of marine debris.
- Plastics now comprise one of the biggest threats to the marine environment.
- Biodegradable plastic bags are not currently a feasible alternative because of the lack of commercial composting facilities necessary to recycle them.
- 2.86 billon plastic bags are used annually in Canada 200 for every one of us.
- Bags remain toxic as microplastics, even after they break down

(Vancouver Island Surfrider Foundation)

A recent study by the Vancouver Aquarium documented approximately 4000 particles of microplastics per cubic meter of water in the Straight of Georgia





Progress on Vancouver Island

- Locally, Cumberland Council directed staff to prepare a Single-Use Item Regulation Bylaw to regulate the use of single-use plastics on Nov. 13th, 2018
- Other municipalities considering such a ban are : Nanaimo, Parksville, Qualicum, Tofino, Saanich, Esquimalt, Campbell River, and the City of Victoria
- BC Supreme Court upheld the Ban on Single-Use Plastic Bags in Victoria on June 19th, 2018
- Federally, Gord Johns Motion M-151 to Combat Marine Plastic Pollution was passed unanimously in the House of Commons on December 5th, 2018



Blue Dot Municipalities

- A reminder, that we are signatories of the Blue Dot municipalities in support of the right to a healthy environment–clean air and water, safe food, a stable climate and a say in decisions that affect our health and well-being.
- Comox signed on June 4th, 2015
- Courtenay signed on July 4th, 2015
- Cumberland signed on September 9th, 2015



Why Municipalities and the Regional District need to initiate a Ban

- Comox Valley coastlines are central to our community identity and future


